Speaking of Water Expand Your Water Vocabulary

Aquifer: an underground layer, often of sand or gravel, that contains water.

<u>Groundwater</u>: fresh water found beneath the earth's surface, stored underground between sand or gravel particles, or in rock crevices.

<u>Overdraft</u>: pumping more water out of an aquifer than there is flowing into it; this depletes the groundwater and lowers the level of the aquifer.

Recharge: water that seeps into the ground to refill the aquifer.



September is National Preparedness Month

This September marks the ninth annual National Preparedness Month. Citizens nationwide are encouraged to plan and actively prepare for disasters or emergencies.

Are you prepared? Reports show that just more than half of people have readiness items in their home set aside for use in disaster; and less than half have supplies in their car.

National Preparedness Month reminds us to set up or replenish our emergency kits, update family emergency plans, and share readiness information.

Don't have a kit? Don't have a plan? Now is the best time to create one. And remember, the first item on your preparedness list should be <u>water</u>, and plenty of it!

Plant of the Month

Autumn Sage - Salvia greggii



Autumn Sage is an erect, bushy, evergreen shrub whose scarlet red flower spikes attract hummingbirds. Its long flowering season extends from late spring, through fall, and even into winter in our area. Prune old flowering wood by half after flowering declines to start a new flush of growth, usually in mid-February, mid-May, and late August.

This valuable xeriscape plant loves hot, dry areas, and requires well-drained soil.

Plant Form: Evergreen shrub Mature Size: 2' - 3' tall & wide

Water Use: Low

Exposure: Full sun, Part sun
Bloom Time: March - November

Native to: Texas, Mexico

Hardiness: Cold Hardy to <0° F

Autumn sage is great for hummingbird and butterfly gardens, and is effective when planted in masses. Plant near paths to enjoy its clean fragrance.
